### Report of the National Review of Mental Health Programmes and Services

The Commonwealth Government tasked the National Mental Health Commission with conducting a national review of mental health programmes and services. The focus of the review was on assessing the efficiency and effectiveness of programmes and services in supporting individuals experiencing mental ill-health and their families and other support people to lead a contributing life and to engage productively in the community.

The ultimate goal of this Review was to make a set of recommendations for Government to consider, that will create a system to support the mental health and wellbeing of individuals, families and communities in ways that enables people to live contributing lives and participate as fully as possible as members of thriving communities.

This included programmes and services which have as a main objective:

- The prevention, early detection and treatment of mental illness;
- The prevention of suicide;
- Mental health research, workforce development and training; and/or
- The reduction of the burden of disease caused by mental illness.

The Review provides 25 recommendations across nine strategic directions which guide a detailed implementation framework of activity over the next decade. Taken together, they form a strong, achievable and practical plan to reform Australia's mental health system. The Review is framed on the basis of making changes within existing resources, as specified by the Terms of Reference provided to the Commission by the Commonwealth Government.

### Queensland's most vulnerable benefit with early NDIS launch

The Queensland Government has announced funding of close to \$2 million for an early launch of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) in the 2015-16 State Budget.

The launch forms part of the \$1.547 billion 2015-16 Disability Services budget, an increase of \$82 million from the previous financial year. This is in addition to \$52 million for Queensland seniors and pensioner concessions in 2015-16 and \$2 million over four years for seniors' wellbeing, participation and safety.

Minister for Disability Services and Seniors Coralee O'Rourke said establishing an early NDIS launch in Queensland was a key election commitment, after Queenslanders missed out on a trial under the LNP.

"The NDIS is the biggest social reform since Medicare, changing the lives of people with disability and creating up to 13,000 jobs in the state's disability sector," Mrs O'Rourke said. "It's essential Queenslanders are ready for this transition, and an early launch will allow us to test the roll-out process and see how the scheme will operate in Queensland," she said. "This will give us vital information about how we can transition to the full NDIS across the rest of the state from 1 July 2016."

Mrs O'Rourke said the Budget also recognised the importance of suitable accommodation for people with disability, which the Federal Coalition Budget did not address. "We've allocated almost \$25 million for a range of initiatives that will provide housing accommodation options for people with disability across the state," she said.

### The structural drivers of homelessness in Australia 2001–11

Homelessness is highly concentrated in particular regions, especially those with high proportions of men, sole parents and indigenous persons—suggesting policy-makers need to target these groups and locations. Contrary to expectations, rates of homelessness were lower in areas with weak labour markets and higher where there was affordable housing. Even so, longer term solutions for homelessness should consider ways formerly homeless people might access affordable housing in stronger labour markets.

This project involved descriptive analysis and modelling techniques to understand the structural drivers of homelessness, using data from three Census periods (2001, 2006 and 2011). The project utilised data from the ABS Census of Population and Housing, the Specialist Homelessness Service (SHS) Collection from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, and other relevant data.

Homelessness is found to be highly spatially concentrated, with 42 per cent of the nation's homeless population concentrated in only 33 of the 328 regions (i.e. 10% of all regions) in 2011. By contrast, such regions received only 34 per cent of homelessness resources (in terms of SHS capacity). While this spatial mismatch of resourcing has lessened over time, redressing this imbalance is an important area for policy attention.

Homelessness is concentrated in particular urban areas and remote regions of Queensland, Western Australia, and the Northern Territory, with regions with higher shares of males, sole parents and Indigenous persons having higher rates of homelessness. There was weaker evidence of homelessness being linked to younger populations with this mainly being an urban phenomenon. Policy-makers might seek to target these demographic groups and regions.

Contrary to expectations, modelling results suggest that areas with high homelessness do not have a shortage of affordable housing (rather they tend to have an abundant supply). Furthermore, weak labour markets (i.e. with higher unemployment) were associated with lower per capita rates of homelessness. Tentative explanations for these puzzling results point to the fact that low-income, low-rent areas have a higher population at risk of homelessness. Relatively fewer people are at risk of homelessness in higher income, lower unemployment regions but they are more vulnerable if they exit housing (since there is a lack of affordable housing in those locations). Homeless people might also migrate to such areas seeking work. Provision of affordable housing in such suburbs might partially address this problem.

## Self-advocacy and inclusion: a summary of the study 'What can be learned from speaking up over the years'

This paper provides an overview of the methods and synthesises findings from an ARC Linkage project that explored Self Advocacy and Inclusion of People with Intellectual Disabilities and considers the implications of the findings in the context of the National Disability Strategy (Commonwealth of Australia, 2011) and reforms to the disability service system through the introduction of the NDIS (2013).

This study has demonstrated the significant contribution that self-advocacy groups make to the social inclusion of individual members and in furthering the inclusive capacity of communities. Self-advocacy groups are hybrid organisations with few parallels.

- They are not simply about advocacy - standing up for the right of their members or supporting people to speak up and stand up for their own rights.
- They are not simply peer support or self-help groups – sharing experiences of occupying a common social position and fostering the emotional growth, skills and well-being of members.
- They are not simply one of the many clubs or societies that make up civic society and constitute the glue that binds communities together - offering membership to those with common interests or shared passions, opportunities to meet people and make friends and a sense of belonging and participation in meaningful activities.

Self-advocacy groups do all of these things well and they are fundamentally important to the social inclusion of people with intellectual disability. They have the potential to transform individuals' lives and contribute to social change in society. Based on rich qualitative data from a small number of groups, this study has provided the evidence for these claims.

## Rental Affordability Snapshot 2015

Anglicare Sydney's 2015 [Rental Affordability Snapshot](#) analysed 14,955 rental properties in Greater Sydney and the Illawarra on the weekend of 11-12 April 2015. The research report clearly shows most properties in the private rental place very low to moderate income families in rental stress.

New research by Anglicare Sydney shows less than 1% of Sydney rental homes are considered to be both appropriate and affordable for households on Government income support payments.

Anglicare Sydney's Rental Affordability Snapshot analysed **14,036** properties that were available in Greater Sydney on the weekend of 11-12 April 2015. Of the **14,036** properties advertised, only **58** were affordable and appropriate for households on income support payments without placing them into rental stress.

"Most of the people who turn to organisations like ours for help are living in the lowest 40 per cent of income distribution and encounter great difficulties finding safe, affordable and appropriate housing in the private rental market," says Anglicare Sydney Director of Advocacy and Research, Sue King.

Despite a 2,000 increase of listed properties this year, no properties were considered to be affordable and appropriate for single people on Newstart, Disability Support or Youth Allowance.

"The NSW Government must recognise social housing as essential infrastructure and have firm social housing building targets that will see 20,000 dwellings built over 10 years," urged Ms King.

**“Sydney has a desperate lack of social housing supply with more than 59,000 NSW households currently on the waiting list.** This is hardly surprising as there is an estimated overall shortfall of 100,000 affordable and available dwellings across NSW for individuals and families on very low to moderate incomes.”

People on the minimum wage fared a little better. For families with both adults earning the minimum wage, there were 2,248 affordable and appropriate properties available.

However, for single parents on the minimum wage, there were substantially fewer suitable properties available, with only 66 properties being both affordable and appropriate. The prospects for single people on the minimum wage were even worse, with only 55 properties across the city.

## Review of the Disability Standards for Accessible Public Transport 2002: final report

[Department of Infrastructure and Regional Development \(Australia\)](#) 10 July 2015

The Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (DDA) allows the Australian Government to make standards to ensure that people with disability are not discriminated against, and to provide information about these standards. The purpose of the Disability Standards for Accessible Public Transport 2002 (Transport Standards) is to enable public transport operators and providers to remove discrimination from public transport services.

Part 34 of the Transport Standards requires the Minister for Infrastructure and Regional Development, in consultation with the Attorney-General, to review the efficiency and effectiveness of the Transport Standards within five years of them taking effect, with subsequent reviews every five years. This report of the Review of the Disability Standards for Accessible Public Transport 2002 (this review) assesses how accessible public transport systems are to people with disability.

An accessible public transport system is also important for planning for Australia's ageing population. In 2012 there were around 3.3 million older people (aged 65 years and over), representing 14 per cent of the population. The Transport Standards also help to ensure Australia meets its international obligations. The ratification of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) in 2008 reflects the Australian Government's commitment to promoting and supporting the equal and active participation by people with disability in economic and social life.

The Australian Government is committed to reducing discrimination against people with disability and to improving accessibility to public transport in collaboration with state and territory governments. The National Disability Strategy 2010-2020 seeks to drive a more inclusive approach to the design of policies, programs and infrastructure so that people with disability can participate as equal citizens in all areas of Australian life. An important outcome of the Strategy is for people with disability to live in accessible and well-designed communities where transport systems are accessible for the whole community.

The Australian Government therefore welcomes the findings of the second legislated review of the Transport Standards which reports on the effectiveness and efficiency of the standards 10 years after their introduction.

### [Autism Occurrence by MMR Vaccine Status Among US Children With Older Siblings With and Without Autism](#)

Despite research showing no link between the **measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine and autism spectrum disorders (ASD)**, beliefs that the vaccine causes autism persist, leading to lower vaccination levels. Parents who already have a child with ASD may be especially wary of vaccinations. Objective of the study was to report ASD occurrence by MMR vaccine status in a large sample of US children who have older siblings with and without ASD. (Sample size 95,727 children) **Conclusions:** In this large sample of privately insured children with older siblings, **receipt of the MMR vaccine was not associated with increased risk of ASD**, regardless of whether older siblings had ASD. ## **Maternal Mild Thyroid Hormone Insufficiency in Early Pregnancy and Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder Symptoms in Children**

Objective was to examine whether exposure to maternal mild thyroid hormone insufficiency in early pregnancy was related to symptoms of attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) in children at 8 years of age. Conclusion. Children exposed to maternal hypothyroxinemia in early pregnancy had more ADHD symptoms, independent of confounders. ## **Alcohol and other drug treatment services in Australia 2013-14**

Around 119,000 clients were estimated to have received over 180,700 treatment episodes from 795 publicly funded alcohol and other drug treatment agencies in 2013-14. Alcohol was the most common drug leading clients aged 30 and over to seek treatment, while cannabis was most common for clients aged 10-29. Over the 5 years from 2009-10, there has been an increase in the proportion of episodes where amphetamines were the principal drug on concern (from 7% to 17%) and an increase in smoking/inhaling as the method of administration for amphetamines. A majority of treatment episodes had a duration of three months or less, and counselling remains the most common treatment type.
