More spent on disability support services in 2011–12

Spending on disability support services provided under the National Disability Agreement rose by 10% between 2010-11 and 2011-12, according to a report released by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW).

The report, Disability support services: services provided under the National Disability Agreement 2011-12, provides information on spending on disability support services, changes in service use and the support needs of service users. 'It is important to have up to date information about people who use disability services as the disability policy and service delivery environment continues to evolve, for example, with the introduction of DisabilityCare Australia,' said AIHW spokesperson Dr Pamela Kinnear. 'Spending on disability support services has continued to rise-after adjusting for inflation, it grew to \$6.9 billion in 2011-12, up 10% from 2010-11 and up 28% since 2007-08.'

The number of people using disability support services grew significantly (by almost 30%) over the five years between 2007-08 and 2011-12. However, growth in the use of services slowed since 2010-11, with a small (1%) rise recorded between 2010-11 and 2011-12. This compares with a 7% rise between 2009-10 and 2010-11. 'This is reflected in the rate of service use, which remained steady between 2010-11 and 2011-12 at about 1 in 70 people, after rising each year up until that point (from 1 in 85 in 2007-08),' Dr Kinnear said.

There were some differences in the types of services used between 2010-11 and 2011-12. 'Notably, the use of accommodation support and community support services both fell by around 3%,' Dr Kinnear said. 'On the other hand, the use of community access and employment services both increased over that time, by 5% and 4% respectively.'

Among users of disability support services, the most commonly-reported disability groups continue to be intellectual (33%), physical (32%) and psychiatric (28%). Most service users needed some assistance in the activities of daily living (52%), independent living (61%) and in work, education and community living (57%).

'Around a quarter of service users used more than one type of service,' Dr Kinnear said.

Disability support service users also received assistance from 133,841 informal carers, an increase of 5% from 127,777 service users with an informal carer in 2010-11.

The AIHW is a major national agency set up by the Australian Government to provide reliable, regular and relevant information and statistics on Australia's health and welfare.

Justice reinvestment for people with disability could save millions

Casey is in her early-20s and has an intellectual disability. Her contact with the criminal justice system and other institutions has cost over \$5.5 million to date. That bill is expected to reach a staggering \$12 million by the time Casey turns 27 if she continues on her current trajectory. But a new report released today by the Australian Human Rights Commission shows Casey's costs could be reduced to \$4 million if she had received early intensive support.

The report, *People with mental health disorders and cognitive impairment in the criminal justice system*, by the University of New South Wales and Price Waterhouse Coopers, models the cost-benefits of introducing diversionary programs early in life for people with mental health disorders and cognitive impairment.

Researchers found that early and intensive support could help people avoid a lifetime in the criminal justice system and save the community millions of dollars. "Justice reinvestment not only offers significant savings but it also has the ability to improve lives and well-being," said Disability Discrimination Commissioner Graeme Innes. "The case studies and costs are real and the cost-benefit modelling is based on services currently available in the community but not widely used," report co-author, Professor Eileen Baldry said. Other case studies presented in the report highlight the significant savings that could be made by providing early access to support programs to improve health, education and well-being. New e-tool supports better mental health care for people with intellectual disability

Health and disability professionals will receive additional training to provide expert care to thousands of people in NSW living with an intellectual disability and a mental illness following the launch of a ground-breaking e-learning website today launched by the Minister for Disability Services Andrew Constance and Minister for Mental Health Kevin Humphries.

Mr Constance said the website would significantly change the way professionals, carers, and eventually people with an intellectual disability themselves access information on intellectual disability and mental health. "We know that people with an intellectual disability are at increased risk of developing a mental health issue," Mr Constance said. "They are a particularly vulnerable group and that is why the NSW Government is committed to taking a more integrated approach between disability and health services."

The innovative educational tool – which is available at www.idhealtheducation.edu.au - is aimed at up-skilling the workforce to meet the unique mental health needs of those people with an intellectual disability. The website has been developed by the Department of Developmental Disability Neuropsychiatry (3DN) at UNSW Medicine and funded by the NSW Government.

Mr Humphries said this new approach would provide a better future for people in NSW with an intellectual disability and mental illness. "This website is the first of its kind in Australia," Mr Humphries said. "It is a practical and accessible approach that will enable health and disability professionals to stop people with an intellectual disability and a mental disorder from falling between the cracks of the two systems."

Associate Professor Julian Trollor, Chair of Intellectual Disability Mental Health and head of 3DN at UNSW Medicine, said that people with an intellectual disability have the same mental health concerns as everyone else, and the e-learning promotes the best practice in their mental health care. "We're very pleased to make this practical educational resource available. We are launching with seven modules that are fundamental to clinical training in this area, aiming to improve knowledge, skills and confidence for healthcare practitioners," Professor Trollor said. "Thanks to the support and collaboration between health and disability services, we have been able to create a learning tool that will generate greater access to much needed education. With future funding, we also have the capacity to expand the site to meet the needs not only of healthcare professionals nationally, but also those who have an intellectual disability and their families."

"The e-learning site's main intention is to improve the quality of life for people with an intellectual disability. Through our holistic approach to mental health and considered planning of the site, we believe this will be achievable in the future."

An estimated 300,000 to 400,000 Australians have an intellectual disability.

This tool encourages inclusion of people with an intellectual disability and a person-centred approach in line with the National Disability Insurance Scheme which began its initial roll out in NSW this month.

New SANE Australia report calls for action to reduce stigma against mental illness

A new study from mental health charity, SANE Australia, reports that stigma and discrimination against people with mental illness is widespread, harmful to recovery, and is a major barrier to participation in society for those affected.

The **new report – *A Life without Stigma*** – concludes that a national strategy to tackle stigma and discrimination associated with mental illness is vital, and should be a non-negotiable component of mental health policies and plans. 'Stigma is a major issue for people affected by mental illness, influencing how they are viewed and how they view themselves' says Jack Heath, CEO of SANE Australia. 'It is destructive, hurtful, and excluding. If we are to help people with mental illness lead a contributing life, it is essential that we take action against stigma.'

A Life without Stigma points out that while significant progress has been made to reduce the stigma associated with depression, Australia urgently needs a national, long-term strategy to reduce the stigma associated with schizophrenia and other psychotic illnesses.

The report's recommendations stress that the strategy must be:

- comprehensive, targeted, long-term, and robustly funded
- inclusive of people living with mental illness and family carers
- based on evidence of good practice, and evaluated
- complementary to existing stigma reduction strategies for depression and anxiety, as well as the Mindframe strategy to reduce stigma in the media
- consistent with the mental health plans of national and state governments, as well as the National Mental Health Commission.

SANE Australia is calling on the major political parties to commit to a national, long-term strategy and campaign to reduce the stigma and discrimination associated with mental illness, with a particular focus on psychotic illness. SANE has written to the Minister for Mental Health, Jacinta Collins as well as the mental health spokespeople for the Coalition and the Greens party, asking them to make stigma reduction a priority for the next government.

'Mental illness is common. With one in five of us affected every year, reducing stigma across all diagnoses is an important issue for everyone' says Jack Heath. 'SANE Australia calls on each party to review the report and make stigma reduction for mental illness a commitment in the upcoming Federal election.'

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New information shows drop in use of seclusion in mental health facilities

Information on seclusion in public mental health facilities has today been made available on the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare's (AIHW) ***Mental Health Services in Australia website***.

Seclusion is defined as confinement at any time of the day or night alone in a room or area from which free exit is prevented. 'This is the first time national seclusion information has been made available in Australia, and it shows that seclusion rates are falling,' said AIHW spokesperson Dr Pamela Kinnear.

Reducing the use of seclusion is a national priority for mental health, and was formally endorsed by health ministers in the *National safety priorities in mental health: a national plan for reducing harm*.

Initiatives were implemented through Australian mental health pilot sites to progress this priority as part of the National Mental Health Seclusion and Restraint (Beacon Site) Project 2007-09. The project resulted in positive changes for reducing the use of restrictive practices in mental health services. 'Seclusion rates fell from 15.6 events per 1,000 bed days in public acute hospital services to 10.6 seclusion events per 1,000 bed days between 2008-09 and 2011-12,' Dr Kinnear said.

Nationally, child and adolescent units had a higher rate of seclusion events (20.9 per 1,000 bed days) compared with general units (11.9) in 2011-12. And seclusion rates have not fallen in recent years for child and adolescent units.

Work is currently underway to investigate whether states and territories can routinely supply data on restrictive practices in line with agreed national definitions.

This research summary defines disability and provides an overview of information regarding the health of people with disabilities and the underlying social determinants, using the population-based data that is available. Despite the high prevalence of disability, Australian evidence regarding the health of people with disabilities is sparse. The Australian and international evidence that does exist shows that the health of people with disabilities is worse than that of their non-disabled peers across a range of health outcomes such as obesity, diabetes, oral health and mental health. Much is known about medical conditions that can cause disability and this is well documented in the medical literature. Many of the health differences are, however, socially determined, rather than due to particular characteristics of the disability itself.
