Special Olympics provides an opportunity for people with an intellectual disability to meet new friends, develop confidence and gain a sense of community. But most importantly, it offers them a chance to have fun by engaging in competitive sport.

Newcastle is hosting the Special Olympics 2013 Asia Pacific Games. The Games are an action under the National Disability Strategy NSW Implementation Plan and are supported with \$1 million from the NSW Government through Ageing, Disability and Home Care and Sport and Recreation. The Games will bring together 32 nations from across the Asia Pacific region. Over 2,500 athletes and carers, 6,000 officials and supporters from overseas and interstate and 200,000 spectators will converge on the Newcastle-Hunter region for the duration of the Games. Athletes from the Asia Pacific region will compete across nine sports – Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Bocce, Cricket, Football, Swimming, Table Tennis and Ten Pin Bowling. The Games would not be possible without the help of dedicated volunteers. Over 4000 local volunteers are being recruited to create a fun, friendly and supportive environment for all those involved. National Disability Insurance Scheme launch sites: projection of the number of young people in Residential Aged Care

The launch of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) on 1 July 2013, heralded the start of a new era for people with disability in Australia.

PricewaterhouseCoopers and the Summer Foundation have been collaborating to undertake a projection of people aged under 65 living in aged care nursing homes in the three NDIS launch sites that are targeting people in this group: Australian Capital Territory, the Hunter region of New South Wales and the Barwon region of Victoria.

The Report estimates that although the NDIS will have been operational in the NDIS launch sites for three years, there will be an additional 40 young people living in nursing homes in these launch sites by June 2016. The report provides an estimate of the unmet needs and resources required for housing and support in the NDIS launch sites.

Name Change back to National Disability Insurance Scheme.

In case you missed the announcement since the federal election.

From 20 September 2013, the name DisabilityCare Australia will revert to the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS). Going forward, the Agency will be known as the **National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA)**.

Our approach to re-naming the Scheme and the Agency will be to minimise associated costs by, for example, letting existing DisabilityCare branded stocks run out before ordering replacement stocks bearing the new names. The Scheme's branding, i.e. our colours, font and design will remain the same, and changes will be made in-house to the maximum extent possible.

United Nations Update from People With Disability <http://www.pwd.org.au/>

An [Australian Civil Society Parallel Report Delegation](#) (the delegation) made up of representatives from Disabled Peoples Organisations (DPOs), disability advocacy organisations, legal and human rights organisations attended the review to ensure that the views of people with disability were provided to the CRPD Committee. These views are contained in the CRPD Parallel Report, [Disability Rights Now](#).

The CRPD Committee has now released its [Concluding Observations for Australia](#). The Concluding Observations outline positive reforms that Australia has implemented to progress the rights of people with disability, as well as recommend areas where concerted action needs to be made.

The delegation is very pleased that nearly all the issues that it raised with the CRPD Committee are addressed by the Concluding Observations. The Concluding Observations congratulate Australia for the positive reforms that have been implemented:

- The National Disability Strategy;
- The National Disability Insurance Scheme;
- International cooperation programs that support disability inclusive development; and
- The Australian Law Reform Commission Inquiry into equal recognition before the law for people with disability, as well as pilot supported-decision making initiatives.

However, the Concluding Observations outline principal areas of concern and corresponding recommendations. The Concluding Observations can now be used in advocacy efforts by people with disability, their representative and advocacy organisations. They should also be used by governments throughout Australia to review, plan and implement further actions for progressing the rights of people with disability in Australia.

Relationship between disability due to a mental health condition and crime victimisation

This publication examines the relationship between disability due to a mental health condition and crime victimisation, and how this relationship varies across different sociodemographic groups.

Mental health and crime are two major areas of social concern for the Australian community and government. According to the 2011-12 Australian Health Survey, 3 million Australians (13.6%) have a mental and behavioural condition, with the cost of supporting people with mental illness in Australia estimated to be around \$28.6 billion a year. According to the 2011-12 Crime Victimization Survey, an estimated 1.1 million Australians (6.1%) aged 15 years and over were a victim of physical or threatened assault in the 12 months prior to survey, and of the 8.7 million households in Australia, approximately 421,600 (4.8%) were victims of an actual or attempted break-in. The cost of crime to the Australian economy is estimated to be nearly \$36 billion a year. Overall, the results of the analysis show that persons who have been a victim of crime are significantly more likely to have a disability due to a mental health condition than persons that have not been a victim of crime, although this varied across the different sociodemographic groups examined. Whilst the data is limited in its ability to offer insight into how these two variables are causally related, the findings represent an important first step in highlighting the link between crime victimisation and mental health.

Health expenditure Australia 2011-12

Expenditure on health in Australia was estimated to be \$140.2 billion in 2011-12, up from \$82.9 billion in 2001-02. This expenditure was 9.5% of GDP in 2011-12, up from 9.3% in 2010-11 and up from 8.4% in 2001-02. The estimated recurrent expenditure on health was \$5,881 per person. Governments funded 69.7% of total health expenditure, a slight increase from 69.1% in 2010-11. The largest components of health spending were public hospital services (\$42.0 billion, or 31.8% of recurrent expenditure), followed by medical services (\$23.9 billion, or 18.1%) and medications (\$18.8 billion, or 14.2%).
