### Launch of the first World Disability Report

**More than one billion people worldwide experience some form of disability**, the United Nations and the World Bank said today in a report that calls for the elimination of barriers that often force the people with disabilities to “the margins of society.”

The [World Report on Disability](#), developed by the World Health Organization ([WHO](#)) and the World Bank, with contributions from over 380 experts, urges governments “to step up efforts to enable access to mainstream services and to invest in specialized programmes to unlock the vast potential of people with disabilities.”

“Disability is part of the human condition,” said WHO Director-General Margaret Chan at a ceremony in UN headquarters to launch the report. “Almost every one of us will be permanently or temporarily disabled at some point in life.”

“We must do more to break the barriers which segregate people with disabilities, in many cases forcing them to the margins of society,” Dr. Chan said.

Etienne Krug, a WHO disability specialist, suggested that the barriers themselves are a cause of disability. “Disability results a lot from the barriers that society erects for people with disabilities,” he said, “barriers such as stigma and discrimination; such as lack of access to health services and rehabilitation services or problems of access to transportation and buildings and information services.”

**About 15% of the world's population lives with some form of disability, of whom 2-4% experience significant difficulties in functioning.** The global disability prevalence is higher than previous WHO estimates, which date from the 1970s and suggested a figure of around 10%. This global estimate for disability is on the rise due to population ageing and the rapid spread of chronic diseases, as well as improvements in the methodologies used to measure disability.

### **\$200 million funding for students with disability to improve school experiences**

The Prime Minister Julia Gillard and the Minister for School Education Peter Garrett recently announced new budget funding of \$200 million to provide extra support for students with disability in Australian schools.

The Australian Government believes that every child deserves a great education that meets their needs and allows them to reach their full educational potential. Through the More Support for Students with Disabilities initiative, the Government is providing \$200 million in new funding. Funding will be allocated to government and non-government education authorities and non-government schools.

This new funding will provide immediate benefits to students with disabilities and their families, such as:

- the provision of coordinated and specialised services by health and student welfare specialist within a school such as speech or occupational therapy;
- the provision of specialised assistive technologies for use in classrooms so that students are better able to learn and engage with their classmates, such as hearing loops or IT equipment;
- additional hours of in-class support from paraprofessionals, health and allied health professionals; and
- adapted curriculum tailored to their needs based on the latest research and expert advice.

In addition, students with disabilities will benefit from enhanced support for their teachers so their teachers can:

- better plan and deliver programs, lessons and activities that enhance the way students with disabilities learn and are included in the classroom; and
- engage paraprofessionals, health and allied health professionals to assist them in providing appropriate support for students in their classrooms, outdoor learning areas and other school learning environments like Trade Training Centres and sports and facilities.

There are more than 164 000 students with disabilities in Australian schools.

The Government will provide new funding to education authorities to strengthen support for students with disabilities and non government schools up until December 2013.

Education authorities will commence implementation of this initiative in schools from the beginning of the 2012 school year. Parents can talk to their local education authority to find out more about the More Support for Students with Disabilities initiative. The initiative will conclude by December 2013.

The Government's Review of Funding for Schooling is currently undertaking work to provide recommendations on the future funding arrangements for schooling in Australia beyond 2013.

As part of this work, the panel leading the review is considering the most appropriate funding arrangements for students with disabilities.

The panel is due to report to the Government by the end of this year.

### **Survey On Arts Uptake Reveals Dearth Of Professional Practitioners**

A new survey of *Arts programs/Projects for People with Disability* has revealed a pleasing increase in provision of arts programs for people with disability that is sadly not matched by appropriate delivery.

This comprehensive survey is the first of its kind to be undertaken in NSW. Accessible Arts NSW, the peak body for the arts and disability sector in the state, invited 806 organisations and individuals to participate in the online survey or which 22% responded.

*Arts Programs/Projects for People with Disability* survey found that while services using new and current artforms such as digital media were on the rise, creative writing was rarely offered. The majority of arts programs are offered to people with intellectual disability with the younger proportion of this demographic (19- 25 year olds) having the highest uptake. Not surprisingly the issues of adequate funding and access to suitable venues ranked high as concerns across the board.

Fulbright Professional Scholarships are available to Australian citizens, in junior to mid career positions, poised for advancement to a senior role from the private or public sector (outside academe), or junior to middle level academics whose professional focus is industry related and whose research and sharing of results within the industry is clearly outlined. The award supports a 3-4 month program of professional development in the United States.

Application proposals must include an educational component (such as a short-course and/or research) and identify a potential U.S. host institution at which the applicant would spend a significant period of their scholarship. It may also involve other forms of professional experience including visits to relevant organisations. While the program may include attending a conference, this does not fulfill the educational requirements of the scholarship. The Professional Scholarship does not fund postgraduate (i.e. Masters or PhD) study programs.

**Applications for the 2012 Fulbright Australian Scholarships are open and will close on 31 August 2011.**

### Better Start for Children with Disability

The Australian Government has announced \$122 million in funding over 4 years to provide services and support to children up to 15 years of age with a disability that affects their development. From July 1 2011, children aged under 6 who have been diagnosed with a listed disability (cerebral palsy, Down Syndrome, Fragile X, vision or hearing impairments) will be eligible to access early intervention funding of up to \$12 000. ### NSW Government Moves Towards Individualised Funding For Disabilities

Minister for Ageing and Disability Services, Andrew Constance, said individualised funding packages would put carers and people with a disability at the centre of decision-making. "Under the O'Farrell Government's proposal, people with a disability won't be dictated to by bureaucrats when it comes to the services they receive," Mr Constance said. "This will put carers and people with a disability in control of their funding arrangements."

A two day summit will be held on the 7th and 8th of July to start the important process of consultation. "The summit will be the catalyst for a significant program of over 100 consultation sessions which will be held throughout NSW over the second half of this year," Mr Constance said. "It'll give us the information we need to make sure we are delivering what people want," Mr Constance said. "The NSW Government is actively seeking the advice of people with a disability about their needs and aspirations for personalised service delivery."

The Government will work with peak bodies such as the Disability Council, NSW Council of Social Services (NCOSS), National Disability Service NSW and consumer organisations.

"Individualised funding packages will give people with a disability more choice and control over their lives and futures, including how the system supports them," Mr Constance said. After this phase of the consultation, the feedback would be analysed to produce a draft person centred model for NSW.

The NSW Government has committed \$2 billion in new growth funding to implement the second phase of *Stronger Together*, which will see the roll-out of more than 47,000 new disability services and places between 2011 and 2016.

### Disability Convention Receives 100<sup>th</sup> Ratification

#### More countries Commit to Realizing Rights of World's Largest Minority

NEW YORK, 12 May – The Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities is the first international human rights treaty of the twenty-first century. On 10 May, Colombia became the 100<sup>th</sup> country to ratify this Convention. In doing so, it joins the ranks of those countries that now support greater access, backed by their legal systems, for citizens with disabilities to fully participate in the lives of their communities, including the political process and health and education services.

“This is an important milestone for Colombia and for the global community. The Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities is a powerful tool for inclusion and development. Let us use it to make concrete improvements in the lives of persons with disabilities,” said United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, commenting on the 100<sup>th</sup> ratification.

Around 10 per cent of the world's population, or 650 million people, live with a disability. They comprise the world's largest minority who are excluded from fully participating in the economic, social, political, legal and cultural life of their communities. To address this inequality, in 2006, the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, which was drafted along with the participation of persons with disabilities and their organizations. At its core, the Convention ensures that persons with disabilities enjoy the same human rights as everyone else. A record number of 82 countries — the highest in the history of a United Nations treaty — signed it on the opening day.

The Convention marks a shift away from the old “medical” view of disability towards a more “social” view that “disability” is a result of the interaction between a person and his/her environment, and not something that resides in the individual as the result of an impairment. An estimated 386 million of the world's working-age population are disabled, but unemployment among the persons with disabilities is as high as 80 per cent in some countries.

Sha Zukang, the United Nations Under-Secretary-General of the Department of Economic and Social Affairs, which serves as the secretariat for the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, said: “We are greatly encouraged by this 100<sup>th</sup> ratification of the Convention. This is a great achievement by the international community in working towards a just and equitable society, based on equality and equal opportunity for all, including persons with disabilities.”

### **Achieving equal employment opportunities for people with disabilities through legislation. Guidelines**

These guidelines reflect the reappraisal of disability as a human rights issue. Intended for policy-makers and drafters of legislation, they have been developed with a view to assisting in improving the effectiveness of national laws concerning training and employment of disabled persons, as part of an ILO Project "The Employment of People with Disabilities: The impact of Legislation". This project aims to enhance the capacity of governments of selected countries to implement effective legislation on the employment of people with disabilities - either in the form of laws, or revisions to existing laws, or through the development of regulations or policies to implement laws. The project also provides technical assistance to selected national governments in implementing necessary improvements to their laws. These drafting guidelines are a valuable tool to support this technical advisory role.

### **WIPO launches accessible publishing guidelines**

The Enabling Technologies Framework is a three-year project funded by WIPO and endorsed by the Stakeholders Platform of WIPO that was started in June 2010. This joint project involving both EDItEUR and the DAISY Consortium aims to further develop mainstream publishing processes so that they can deliver digital publications that are fully accessible to persons with reading disabilities. At the end of the first year of the project, EDItEUR launched the "Accessible Publishing, Best Practice Guidelines for Publishers" that are available in HTML, Word and PDF at <http://www.visionip.org>.

The AODA was enacted to provide for the development, implementation and enforcement of accessibility standards to achieve the goal of an Ontario that is accessible for persons with disabilities by 2025. ### Early Intervention Service Provider Panel Application

FaHCSIA is establishing a panel of service providers to deliver early intervention services to eligible children as part of the Better Start for Children with Disability initiative. The aim of the Panel is to improve access to targeted and appropriate early intervention services for eligible children.

FaHCSIA is seeking applications from eligible organisations and sole providers who wish to apply to join the Better Start for Children with Disability Early Intervention Service Provider Panel (The Panel).
